Summertime Recycling Tips

While recycling may seem to be a challenge during outdoor • Consider replacing your large kitchen trash can with activities such as camping, hiking, picnics and parties, there are ways to help keep it in the daily routine. Some recycling tips to consider include:

- At picnics and BBQ's this summer, be sure to bring an extra bag with you to collect bottles and cans. Place the bag next to your trash can and mark it so that people know you are recycling all those cans and bottles. Throw the bag in the back of your car and empty it into your curbside recycling cart for collection and please remember not to put plastic bags in the recycling cart.
- Using sturdy and washable mugs, cups, utensils, tableware and cloth napkins at home and for picnics, outdoor parties and potlucks can save waste.
- Rinse bottles and cans before you put them in the recycling cart. (This helps prevent any unwanted bugs and odors during summertime heat!)

- Purchase food and beverage products that come in recyclable packaging, such as aluminum, plastic or glass drink bottles and cans, and paperboard snack boxes.



- When choosing between two similar products, select the one with the least unnecessary packaging.
- Talk to your family about recycling at home. Make a fun game for kids to collect cans and bottles and to put in the recycling cart.

Reminders...

Recyclable items should be placed loose in recycling cart and *plastic shopping bags are not accepted*. Most grocery stores have a collection box and will take them back. Also, there will be NO interruption in collection service for the Labor Day holiday, Monday September 7, 2009 however the office will be closed.

What Do I Put Into the Organics Cart?

Organics Acceptable List

- Grass and weed clippings
- Shrubs and tree prunings (less than 4" in diameter)

Non-acceptable Organics List

- · No household garbage
- · No plastic bags
- · No dirt or rocks

- When you buy from catalogs over the phone or online, make sure to let the company know that you do not want them to sell, share, or trade your name or send you promotional materials.
