Sharp objects that fall from the top of an overstuffed cart can cause a safety hazard for pedestrians and vehicles. We appreciate your help to keep your home and our city safe and clean.

In the United States we use over 88 billion plastic throw away bags that take 12 million barrels of oil to make. Less than 1 percent of these will be recycled, according to Worldwatch Institute, and each bag can take up to 1,000 years to decompose.

Food scraps and food-soiled paper are the largest unrecycled portion of the residential waste stream. By recycling food scraps we are able to help save landfill space and create compost.

I will do my best to keep household batteries and fluorescent lamps out of my trash cart.

As of February 9, 2006 State law requires all types of household batteries and fluorescent lamps to be recycled. They can no longer be thrown in the trash. Please collect batteries in a non-leaking sturdy plastic container and take to the Household Hazardous Waste drop-off site nearest you. What Do I Put Into the Organics Cart?

The reason Organics Carts are so important is that they help divert tons of materials away from our landfills which saves costs and is better for the environment. Here is a list to help you utilize your cart efficiently. Thank you for helping us provide you with the best possible service.

Organics Acceptable List

- Grass and weed clippings
- Shrubs and tree prunings (less than 4" in diameter)
- Leaves, plants and flowers
- Food scraps and food soiled paper products

Non-acceptable Organics List

- · No household garbage
- No plastic bags
- No dirt or rocks
- · No overloading lid must be closed

Why we recycle food scraps

Food scraps and food soiled paper are the largest single item in our waste stream - making up approximately 35% of what we throw away in Alameda County. Food scraps are a resource, not a waste. By participating in the food scrap recycling program, food scraps and food soiled paper are sent to a composting facility. Instead of taking up space in the landfill, your food scraps become compost - a valuable resource used by landscapers and farmers.

Recycling food scraps is easy

- 1. Collect food scraps in kitchen pail
- 2. Empty the contents of your kitchen pail into your green yard waste cart
- 3. Set out your green yard waste cart for weekly pickup, but please don't set your little pail out at the curb.

Helpful hints:

Line your pail with a paper bag or newspaper to help keep it clean. Using the pail is not required. You can collect your food scraps in paper ice cream cartons, take-out containers, milk cartons paper bags or any other paper container that works for you.

What to include:

All Food Products
Fruit, vegetable, breads, cereal, dairy
Meat, fish (including bones)
Leftovers & table scraps
Coffee Grounds, filters & tea bags
Food-Soiled Paper
Paper towels, plates & napkins

What not to include:

Pizza boxes

Plastic (bags, containers, Styrofoam etc.), Glass, Metal and Liquids
